"Crews battled wildfires in North and South Carolina on Sunday amid dry conditions and gusty winds as residents were forced to evacuate in some areas... In South Carolina, where more than 175 fires burned 6.6 square miles (17 square kilometers), Gov. Henry McMaster declared a state of emergency on Sunday to support the wildfire response effort, and a statewide burning ban remained in effect... In North Carolina, the U.S. Forest Service said fire crews were working to contain multiple wildfires burning in four forests across the state on Sunday. "**via** <u>AP News</u>

Due to dry conditions, a wildfire in Polk County spread another 100 acres over the afternoon of March 3, burning 593 acres near the towns of Saluda and Tryon. As of March 4, the fire is 593 acres with 63% containment. The governor will provide informational updates on current state of emergencies and potential impacts from the storm. Office of the Governor – Henry McMaster

There are nearly 175 wildfires, impacting 4,200 acres across the state, including Horry, Spartanburg, Oconee, Union, and Pickens Counties primarily due to dry, windy conditions. Governor McMaster declared a state of emergency on March 2nd, 2025 to support South Carolina's ongoing response to the wildfires and a <u>statewide burn ban</u> remains in effect. Read the full declaration <u>here</u>. As of March 4, the fire is at 30% containment. Additionally, the governor is responsible for announcing when FEMA assistance has been approved for the state. There has been no federal assistance called in for the fire, according to the governor. Governor McMaster stated that private insurance should take care of most damages.

The South Carolina Department of Environmental Services (SCDES)

The SCDES has issued an Air Quality Alert for fine particulates for Horry County in South Carolina until further notice. According to the SCDES, an Air Quality Alert means that, "the fine particulate concentrations within the specified areas may approach or exceed unhealthy standards due to local wildfire smoke in the Myrtle Beach area. SCDES recommends that individuals with respiratory health issues limit time spent outdoors and/or move all activities indoors to avoid the smoke or fine particulates. Keep windows and doors closed. Run an air conditioner if you have one but keep the fresh-air intake closed and the filter clean to prevent outdoor smoke and fine particulates from getting inside."

Evacuation and Shelter

All evacuations have been lifted at this time and there have been no reported structural losses.

The Red Cross shelter at Carolina Forest Recreation Center in Horry County is now closed. The facility will be utilized for wildfire response operations for public safety agencies in the meantime. Residents needing assistance can call the Eastern South Carolina chapter of American Red Cross at: 843-477-0020.

The after school program normally held at the Carolina Forest Recreation Center will be held at the Carolina Forest Senior Center located next to the Carolina Forest Library at 2246 Carolina Forest Boulevard, Myrtle Beach, SC. All other programs will be canceled.

U.S. Small Business Administration

The Small Business Administration (SBA) loans money to homeowners and renters whose homes have been damaged in a disaster. You may be eligible even if you do not own a business. To qualify for an SBA home loan your home must be in a presidentially declared disaster area, the loan must be for your primary home, and the loan cannot duplicate benefits from insurance policies or benefit programs.
